

Pastor Alex on Prayer Article #2

A.C.T.S. is a model of prayer that was taught to me at a young age, and it is one that I keep in the back of my mind when I pray. As I said in my previous article, I do not want prayer to become formulaic so this is simply an option to consider. The ACTS model of prayer is not the only way to pray, nor is it is the "right" way to pray, but it can be a helpful tool. Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, and Supplication make up this acronym. We adore God for who God is as we are in awe of His love for us. We confess that we are sinners before God who receive His forgiveness constantly, thanks be to God. Remember the words of Confession & Pardon each time we have a communion Sunday "...we confess that we have not loved you with our whole heart...forgive us, we pray..." We give thanks to God because God has first loved us. A pastor once asked me, "what if tomorrow, you only had the things you were thankful for today?" - we have so much to be thankful for when we frame it like that. Lastly, **supplication** (asking for something) before God. There is nothing wrong with supplication, in fact, God wants us to ask for things in His name (cf. Philippians 4:6-7). However, supplication is not the primary purpose of prayer. God is much more than a cosmic Santa Claus who gives us what is on our list. Perhaps our supplications might even change once we have taken the journey through adoration, confession, and thanksgiving first.



What is Palm Sunday?

The name comes from a story in the Bible in which Jesus triumphantly entered the city of Jerusalem. Prior to this event, Jesus and his friends roamed the countryside teaching and performing miracles, gaining much of recognition. The people of Jerusalem were very excited that Jesus was coming to their city to celebrate Passover. In their excitement, the people waved palm branches and threw their cloaks before Jesus on the road.

We still commemorate Palm Sunday. It starts a week of remembrance for Christians, often referred to as Holy Week. The week ends with the celebration of Easter. Throughout this week we mark the different events that led to Jesus' Resurrection and Easter. Palm Sunday has a festive atmosphere. In some churches children wave palm branches and parade around

the sanctuary shouting "Hosanna!" The paradox is that we celebrate knowing full well what came next in the story. After Jesus' triumphal entry: He was rejected, betrayed and crucified.

The events of Holy Week remind us that the week turns from celebration on Palm Sunday to rejection and death the following Friday. The story ends with the Resurrection, which we'll celebrate on Easter Sunday.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

The Harbor District's UMW Social Action Day was held on March 7th at Lake Waccamaw UMC. The mission activities of several UMW groups were highlighted.

Kenansville UMW has a Senior Ministry Program that is held on the second Wednesday of the month. Any man or woman in the area is welcome to attend. The programs start with a devotion and prayer after which a healthy meal is served followed by an activity such as a craft project or a Bingo game.

Ocean View UMW started a Creation Care Team to make the church more eco-friendly. Things the church is now doing include: using organic cleaning and gardening products, using real plates, glasses, cups and utensils, using cloth tablecloths, using recyclable take-out containers and hot beverage cups. and providing recycling containers for garbage.

Harbor UMW supports 2 organizations in Wilmington that work to help victims of human trafficking: **Safe Place** and **514 Revolution**. Safe Place helped 141 victims last year. 514 Revolution located and rescued a girl who had gone off with an older man. Disturbing statistics on human trafficking were given: it is a \$32,000,000,000 industry; 50% of the victims are under 18; 200,000 American children were taken or sold by their parents last year.

Pine Valley UMW has been involved with Common Thread Ministry since 2009. This ministry began by reaching out to AIDS patients. Pillowcases were made and given to the patients. The ministry has expanded and now provides pillowcases to patients at Lower Cape Fear Hospice.

Camp UMW is involved in a sewing ministry for Days for Girls International. In third world countries, sanitary supplies for menstruation are not available and girls and women must resort to using rags, mattress stuffing, banana leaves, feathers and even cow dung. Sometimes the women sit on cardboard boxes until their cycles are over. Days for Girls provides patterns for volunteers to sew washable panty liners and waterproof shields. The finished liners and shields are put in kits with underpants, soap and educational materials. These supplies allow the women to lead their lives to the fullest.

BEING GOOD STEWARDS

Concerned about the coronavirus and can't find hand sanitizer and disinfecting wipes? Here are some recipes for environmentally friendly substitutes. Be safe and be well.

Disinfecting Wipes

- 2 cups warm water
- 1 Tbs. liquid soap
- 1 cup rubbing alcohol (at least 70%, 90% is better)

Mix together. Cut roll of paper towels in half. Place in a container that just fits them. (Don't leave much space around the paper towels, so the liquid is absorbed.) Pour liquid over paper towels. Pull out the cardboard tube.

Disinfecting Spray Cleaner

- 1 1/4 cups water.
- 1/4 cup white vinegar.
- 1/4 cup rubbing alcohol
- 15 drops essential oil (peppermint + lemon OR lavender + lemon) OPTIONAL

Mix together. Put in glass spray bottle.
