### **When Labor Day Meant Something**

Somewhere along the line, Labor Day lost its meaning. Today the holiday stands for little more than end of summer and the start of school, weekend-long sales, and maybe a barbecue or parade. It is no longer political. Many politicians and commentators do their best to avoid any mention of organized labor when observing the holiday, maybe giving an obligatory nod to that abstract entity, "the American Worker."

Labor Day, though, was meant to honor not just the individual worker, but what workers accomplish together through activism and organizing. Indeed, Labor Day in the 1880s, its first decade, was in many cities more like a general strike—often with the waving red flag of socialism and radical speakers critiquing capitalism—than a leisurely day off. So, to really talk about this holiday, we have to talk about those-which-must-not-be-named: unions and the labor movement.

The labor movement fought for fair wages and to improve working conditions, as is well known, but it was its political efforts that did nothing less than transform American society. **Organized labor was** critical in the fight against child labor and for the eight-hour workday and the New Deal, which gave us Social Security and unemployment insurance. Union workers sacrificed in America's historic production effort in World War II and pushed for Great Society legislation in the 1960s.

## AdMinistry Team's Update on August 10th, 2023 Meeting

Our realtors, having received no interest or inquiries about the 11-acre parcel of land which we listed with them, have asked if we would be willing to lower the price, which we had set at \$400,000. The land has been publicized and builders have been made aware of it, so the relators believe we priced it too high. Before dealing with the price, it was decided to investigate engaging a logging service to bring down some of the trees and garner some funds from selling them. We are aware of two contacts who can guide that decision. Tom Evans and Jill Greene will research that possibility and report back at the next AdMinistry Meeting.

It was suggested that the financial status of the church, where we report less income than expenses in the bulletin every week, needs to be more thoroughly discussed with the congregation. We should be transparent about the fact that we have a substantial reserve, and that we have filed a request with the IRS under the Employee Retention Credit. We also plan to run a more formal Stewardship Campaign this fall. At the same time, it would be useful to step back and summarize where we are in terms of the Ministries we provide in our post-disaffiliation world. It was decided to present a "State of The Church" briefing on these issues following a future Worship Service and invite all who are interested to stay for a few minutes for that purpose.

Due to the amazing amount of donations provided over the last two months, it was recognized that it would not be possible set up the entire yard sale on the morning of the event. Instead, it was decided to take the following actions:

- 1) we will ask volunteers to put up tents and bring out tables on Thursday the 17<sup>th</sup>
- 2) the volunteers will then bring out the donations to display them on the tables on Friday the 18<sup>th</sup>
- 3) the Shallotte Police Department will be asked to park a car in our parking lot to provide overnight security, and
- 4) volunteers will be asked to arrive beginning at 6:00 a.m. on Saturday the 19<sup>th</sup> to set up the bake sale and silent auction.

Rae Mathews, Wiley Ballard and Jack Rector have completed our required annual internal audit. The findings were very positive in terms of accurate record keeping and appropriate safeguards. The audit team made three recommendations:

- 1) the consolidation of restricted funds into the General Fund
- 2) to separate the books of the church from those of Mothers Morning Out
- 3) to encourage the congregation to give to the General Fund rather than to Restricted Funds.

While those recommendations were taken under advisement for future consideration, the Internal Audit was accepted with thanks by the AdMinistry Team.

### ARMENIA AND NAGOMO-KARBAKH

CUMC is currently busy collecting items for our Project Agape Christmas boxes, are ministry in Armenia. The following article we give you an in-depth look at the suffering the people of this area has endured through the years.

"Upon the disintegration of the Transcaucasian Federation with the proclamation of the independent Democratic Republic of Georgia on May 26, 1918, both Azerbaijan and Armenia proclaimed their independence on the same day, May 28, 1918. Each of these countries laid claim to the territory which they saw as historically and ethnically theirs; these territorial disputes led to the Armenian–Azerbaijani War between 1918 and 1920, a series of conflicts that ended only when both Armenia and Azerbaijan were annexed by the Soviet Union. In 1924, the Soviet Union created the Nagorno-Karabakh Autonomous Region within Azerbaijan when over 94% of the region's population was Armenian". Wickipedia

"Armenia and Azerbaijan have been locked in a dispute over the contested territory of Nagorno-Karabakh since the collapse of the Soviet Union. The territory of Nagorno-Karabakh is internationally recognized as part of Azerbaijan. It has an ethnic Armenian majority, however, and is backed by Armenia. Nagorno-Karabakh's effort to secede in 1988 was the catalyst for the war that ended with a Russian-brokered ceasefire in 1994. After the fighting ended, Armenian forces wholly or partially asserted control over the Nagorno-Karabakh region and seven adjacent districts". (There were clashes over Nagomo-Karabakh in 2008, 2010, 2016 and 2020.)




On April 23, 2023 Azerbaijani forces installed a checkpoint along the Lachin Corridor on the Armenia-Azerbaijan border, which controlled the flow of goods into the Nagorno-Karabakh region which impedes the provision of humanitarian aid. www.securitycouncilreport.org

The ongoing blockade of the Lachin Corridor is endangering the lives of thousands of people in the breakaway region of Nagorno-Karabakh. The human rights organization called on Azerbaijan's authorities and Russian peacekeepers to immediately unblock the route and bring an end to the unfolding humanitarian crisis. The situation has left some 120,000 ethnic Armenian residents in Nagorno-Karabakh without access to essential goods and services, including life-saving medication and health care. www.amnesty.org

With all the years of wars and skirmishes, the situation for the Armenians in Armenia and in Nagomo-Karabakh is disquieting. Project AGAPE is the only humanitarian group working in the Nagorno-Karabakh. westnash.ogr

On Thursday the August 17th<sup>th</sup> a team of about 20 people raised a dozen tents all over the grounds and brought out almost every table in the Church. An even larger team worked all day on August 18th<sup>h</sup> to bring out all that was donated to display on those tables. This project was more than just an economic success, it was a wonderful team effort that built an even stronger sense of family in our church community.
