COME HOME FOR CHRISTMAS

I've thought about what Joseph must have pondered as he prepared to return to his ancestral home in Bethlehem. It wasn't a trip he had planned to make and certainly not one he thought would include the companionship of his betrothed, Mary, who was in her third trimester of pregnancy. This going home was dictated by authority, not by choice. The pilgrimage was long, uncomfortable and exhausting, but also one of surprise and wonder. Joseph's trip home not only resulted in the making of a family, but most importantly, the birth of the Christ child. A Savior who would bring love and light to a fallen world and give us all a path to find our way home.

While the Advent Season is a reason to celebrate and anticipate, it is also a time when we can get caught up in the emotional hurdles of the past and feeling anxious about the future. How can we find the hope, peace, joy and love that often get lost in these human emotions and blocks our way home? I sat down with Pastor Terry to hear what he had to say about finding our way home, especially at this time of year:

What do you think has caused discord in the church and caused people, especially young people, to distance themselves from the church?

Pastor Terry: A lot of people have been damaged by the church. It wasn't intentional to hurt people, but the residual impact due to disagreements, prejudices and of course, disaffiliation, influenced many and the mistrust was inevitable. It's my prayerful hope we can put that season behind us as we await the season of Advent, focus our thoughts on coming home to the church, learning and trusting again, and worship Jesus who loves us unconditionally. If we focus on moving forward, there will once again be an opportunity to share the unconditional love we know and trust with the body of Christ. Bringing people back home is who Camp UMC is at their core!

What brings you hope of bringing people back into the church?

Pastor Terry: The season of Advent begins a new church year as we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus. His birth is an invitation and Christmas Day leads us into the full Christmas spirit. Everything is transformed around Jesus's birth, and with this deeper invitation comes an opportunity for us all to come home. Replacing apathy or complacency with hope and joy gives us added strength entering 2024.

What are your plans, as a pastor, to initiate a calling for people to come back home? **Pastor Terry:** Our main purpose is to bring people back into a life with Christ and a deepening of their faith. We've recently launched an evangelism campaign that was birthed out birthed out of a

Recent AdMinistry Team's Decisions

The Church AdMinistry team has made a number of decisions which we wish to report to the Congregation.

The Team authorized the Evangelism advisory group to spend \$250 for new color brochures to be placed in the welcome center in the church narthex. New guests will be directed to a rack designed to hold the brochures. The initial order will be for 150 copies of each brochure. They will provide information about Children's programs, outreach, youth, and adult ministries.

The Team also authorized the spending of \$350 for postcards which will be mailed to 1,000 new homeowners, that is, people who have moved to homes within 15 miles of our church during the last two years. The postcards will provide information about our Church and include an invitation to worship with us, with details about our Advent and Christmas services. The theme of the postcards will be: "Come Home for Christmas".

We have had an 11 acre parcel of land, which was donated to the Church by the Mintz family several years ago, listed for sale for several months. The asking price has been \$400,000. Our real estate agents spoke to the Team and advised a price reduction. The land does not have water and sewer service, which will be an expense for whoever decides to purchase the land, and that has been the major concern of those who have shown interest in the property. Our Agents have looked at recent land sales for comparison and believe our asking price is too high. After consideration and discussion, the AdMinistry Team decided to reduce the asking price to \$250,000.

Mothers Morning Out asked for permission to install a shed behind the Church. It is needed for storage. They also asked to be permitted to shore up a portion of the sand box located in the children's playground. Mothers Morning Out will pay for those items. They also asked us to repair the electronic entry pad on the door coming into the classrooms from the playground. The number 0 was missing. The Team authorized the Trustees to pay for that repair, which is estimated to cost \$150.

The Team asked Tamy Munns to put together a technically skilled group to look at any needed improvements in the sound system, for both the sanctuary and on-line worship. That group will report back to the AdMinistry Team on needed improvements and costs.

Ray McKinnon asked the team to approve a \$500 donation from the Mission fund to be sent to the Sierra Leone hospital for them to purchase a blood analyzer. The NC Conference supports this need and this request. The AdMinistry Team approved that donation.

In preparation for the annual Charge Conference, the AdMinistry Team decided to maintain the 2023 salary and benefit package for Pastor Terry for 2024.

A Kitchen for Christmas

Thanks to the hard work of the Trustees, the church AdMinistry Team has approved the final plans for the renovation of the church kitchen. New cabinets have been ordered and we now expect to have them all installed and the kitchen back in service by Christmastime. This renovation project required lots of effort and investment of our time, money, and talent. We needed new drainage, the repair of a water main break, electrical work to bring the kitchen up to code, new appliances, and, of course, new cabinets. We also had the kitchen and fellowship hall painted, new molding installed, and the floors professionally cleaned (the painting and cleaning costs were paid by the Basket Weavers, and we thank them for their donation).

One of the huge tasks, which was handled by the Methodist Men (along with some young volunteers from the Christian Recovery Center,) was the demolition of the old cabinets that had been ruined by the flooding we experienced in the spring/summer. Their efforts helped keep costs down, and we thank them as well.

We have very good news to report about the problems we had with flooding this year. Since the drainage was repaired and the water main break was fixed, we have not had any more water in the kitchen, fellowship hall or the storage rooms beneath the Church offices (formerly the food pantry area.) We continue to review how rainwater is directed by the existing gutters and downspouts on the new building to assure proper flow and dispersion.

The total cost of all that is being done to renovate the kitchen and improve the fellowship hall will be about \$55,000. As a result of our the very successful August yard sale, a special donation, dollars available in the building fund, and a reimbursement from our insurance company, the cost is fully covered with a generous cushion of more than \$20,000 that the Trustees will retain in their restricted fund for future expenditures on building maintenance.

There are some features included in the renovation which are worthy of note:

Fellowship Hall

Cabinet for linens will be 24 feet.

Kitchen

A larger ice maker
A large microwave oven
Two 25-cubic foot refrigerators
Two four-burner stoves with ovens large enough
for the trays for the Friday Night meals
A Bunn commercial coffee maker

The Trustees want to thank everyone who contributed to this renovation through their contributions to the yard sale, donations, and their hours of volunteer labor. We are planning a ribbon cutting and a grand opening of our newly renovated kitchen in January, stay tuned.
