At the end of the meeting, he would be helped to his feet to give a word of exhortation to the church. Invariably, he would repeat, "Little children, let us love one another." The disciples began to grow weary of the same words every time, and they finally asked John why he always said the same thing over and over. John replied, "Because it is the Lord's commandment, and if this only is done, it is enough." (from The Epistles of John by Erdman)

So, here's the challenge for you, for me, for us in the days of February. You have my word, I shall be praying in a love language I know God will honor...

In these 29 days (yep, this year is leap year), for the next 29 days I invite you to pause with me daily and pray specifically for one another. Pray that as we move through the Lenten season I will lead us with a God-inspired vision that will lead this community in a God-honoring way. Recent AdMinistry Team's Decisions

The fellowship hall was her base of operations for the design and complete funding of our columbarium, a project years in the making. The honor of naming the fellowship hall after her is both well-deserved and fitting.

- 2 The AdMinistry Team has decided to follow the advice of the Nurture team, who with the help of the Methodist Men will begin a more organized effort to assist those who need help getting into our buildings. They will be stationing people at the ramps and doors of the Church at appropriate hours and people offering to park cars as well as accompany members and guests both before and after services.
- 3 The AdMinistry team has approved the creation of a new video introducing visitors and new members to the staff and ministries of the church. We have been sending letters of welcome to visitors and now will send a short video via email to those who provide that contact information on our pew pads.
- 4 On the advice of the SPRC chair, the AdMinistry Team has decided to promote Rebecca Colon to the position of Children's Ministry Coordinator. This fills the position from which Marlene Hall recently retired and expands the duties beyond nursery care to include planning the curriculum for select ages involved in the Wednesday night programs.

IN CELEBRATION OF MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

On January 15th, The Greater Shallotte Ministerial Association and Camp United Methodist Church's Agape Ministry Team opened their doors to a community celebration of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr's birthday. Black, white, young and old shared the pews and their hearts in celebration of the man whose 1963 "I Have a Dream" speech outlined the history of racial injustice and challenged America to accountability. Dr. King's words are as relevant now as they were more than sixty years ago and those words were brought to life within the walls of Camp United Methodist Church.

It was an honor to have Shallotte Mayor Walt Eccard welcome everyone and Bishop Michael L. Frink offer an opening prayer. Lady Tatyana Frink inspired with a liturgical dance and special music by Lucas Merriam set the tone for the occasion. There were encouraging readings and prayers by area pastors and law enforcement officers. A challenging sermon was delivered by guest speaker Rev. Dr. Jason Villegas.

Camp's Annabelle Holland gave a history of the man whose name we were celebrating and visiting Chazney Lane Williams gave a reading of the 1963 "I Have a Dream" speech. Neither of these young ladies, nor their parents, were born when Dr. King delivered his powerful, compelling speech. Still, the significant, albeit now historical speech, lays out as much of a blue print of peace and love for them to follow today as it did for those who lived through the ministry and marches of the now fallen great civil rights leader. Prayerfully the next generations will "rise up" and stand with greater determination and new strength to cut the chains of apartheid and hate that still exist, but are too often ignored.

Rev. Villegas challenged the church to not become complacent, but to become young and bold in outreach to accomplish God's will. He stated the "church needs to become youthful in embracing reconciliation and diversity." Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. loved, lived and led by the simple teachings of Jesus. Any form of inferior treatment to others was unacceptable in his ministry. Mark 12:31 "Love your neighbor as yourself." A beautiful commandment, a bold challenge.

Agape member, Cathy White gave a blessing before everyone was dismissed for a luncheon following the celebration program. The long line to the dining area was made shorter by smiles, chatter, laughter and hugs. Walking together, brown arms enfolded in white arms. Everyone huddled together, shrouded in love. For a brief time, it felt like we had indeed "overcome."

trust God's I ve A Lenten Series For Divine Direction

The word *believe* causes all sorts of problems as too many people treat their belief in God like their belief in free speech: some kind of license to be obnoxious without taking responsibility for the damage they do.

As a pastor my job isn't to try and convince you to change your mind and believe in or intellectually consent to the existence of an unseen Deity. My work calls for me to help you open yourself more freely to truths you've been told and say you believe.

But that takes time, and it calls for an adjustment in our mindset.

Which brings us to Trust God's Love. There's a difference in saying we "believe in God" and saying we "trust God." Believing in God is comfortable. Trusting God's Love is riskier. Trusting God's love requires surrendering to God our doubts and fears. Trusting God's love allows us to find true peace and freedom. Trusting God's love moves us to a place of surrendering ourselves to God's wisdom and allows us to fall deeply into relationship with God in an all new, loving way.

LENT FAST and DO IDEAS

FAST from being Negative: Whenever you find yourself in a loop of negative thoughts, try to think of three things you're thankful for instead. It'll boost your outlook *and* your mood.

DO Write One Letter of Gratitude Each Day: Take on a 40-day gratitude challenge and write one thank-you note, text or email each day. If you don't feel comfortable sharing your gratitude, simply write down three things you're thankful for each day in a journal or in your phone's notes app.

DO Donate Three Things Each Day: For example, you could donate three lightly worn pieces of clothing, three toys, three books or three cans of food. Can't find three things? Give a compliment to three strangers or leave a 30% tip on your next meal if you can spare it.

FAST from Gossiping: This Lenten season, steer conversations away from gossip. If a friend starts talking about someone else, say something nice about that person and change the subject. You can also tell your friends that you're trying to avoid gossip. They might appreciate the nudge toward positivity.

FAST from Playing Computer or Electronic Games: If you find yourself grabbing for your Xbox or IPad to play games most nights, see if you can cut back on the habit during Lent. If quitting entirely sounds impossible, try cutting down on your weekday use only.

FAST from Streaming Services: Think you can go 40 days without Netflix? What about Hulu, Disney+, Amazon Prime or HBO Max? Try logging out of your favorite streaming services for the next 40 days. You'll be surprised how much extra time you have.

DO Offer Forgiveness: It's one of the hardest things to do, but offering forgiveness to someone who has hurt you can do wonders for not just them, but your own mental health. And it's equally important to forgive yourself, don't forget.

DO Catch up With Loved Ones: During the daily grind, it's easy to tell ourselves we'll call or text our loved ones later—and then later never comes. Take time every day to send someone you care about a quick text or give them a call to show how much they mean to you.




Pour Theology at Makai Brewery

Fast forward a week, and his name became a steadfast reminder of God's plans. God is using our family, just like I prayed He would, just not in the way I thought He would. We live and breathe the way God is working miracles through Ant. I know it has undoubtedly strengthened our faith as a family, and I pray that we can ripple our faith out and witness to others. Ant is a WALKING testimony of God's love for us! Thank you again, Camp UMC, for covering us in prayer and keeping us moving along this miraculous journey.
