I want to thank Bishop Connie Mitchell Shelton and District Superintendent Tara Lain for their unwavering support during my time here. Both are trusted confidants and colleagues, offering wisdom, guidance and encouragement. I am excited for the years we will continue to serve God in our connection.

On a more personal note, you have welcomed my family into your families. Together we have celebrated many joyous occasions; wedding anniversaries, new births, and holiday meals around our table and yours. We have grieved the loss of family members and we stood together as siblings in days of tragic illness. Together you and my family have forged incredible bonds of trusting relationships that I will treasure forever and always celebrate in my heart.

As a church we have added many wonderful families to our membership, growing in number every year. We elevated into leadership a group of people who have faithfully embraced the opportunity to lead us. We are financially sound due to your generous support. We have built

new ministries and re-established and expanded old ones. #### **Recent Decisions by the Church Council**

During a special meeting on March  $10^{th}$ , the Church Council voted unanimously to approve the Church Budget for 2025. There were several significant spending increases approved.

These included:

A three percent increase in the salaries of the staff (Pastor Terry asked that he be given no increase). Additionally, the Director of Children's Ministry position which was filled for only a portion of 2024 will be filled for all of 2025. We also anticipate increased costs for nursery workers. These increases total just over \$30,000.

A \$25,000 increase in funding for the Trustees to cover higher insurance costs, new air conditioners and heat pumps and repair of the Church Steeple.

The purchase of new computers and increased telephone and internet costs and the cost of new security and cameras. There will also be increased costs for office supplies, higher water/sewer bills and trash removal. These increases total to just over \$12,000.

Anticipation of a \$10,000 increase in the amount we hope to pay toward our Apportionment over what we were able to pay for 2024.

A \$2,000 increase in funding for Missions to help with the cost of the Costa Rica effort.

It is expected that covering these increases will require spending a portion of our reserve. The results of the 2025 stewardship campaign project, which is a similar amount of giving as last year, when we had a virtually balanced budget without the increases outlined above.

Thanks to years of prudent and conservative budgeting our Church has over \$400,000 in reserve. That is over twice the amount advised in the Book of Discipline. The reserve is intended to protect the Church from unexpected expenses such as wind damage to the roof, or other emergency needs. Following disaffiliation, we expected to have to draw down some of our reserve to adjust to a smaller Congregation, and thanks to the generosity of our membership and a belt tightened budget, that has not been necessary. We now believe that rising costs and critical needs will require us to use some of the reserve.

We will watch our spending closely as the year progresses and hope to minimize the use of reserved funds if, for example, repair and maintenance needs turn out to be less than expected, or growth in our membership adds new resources.

#### FINANCIAL UPDATE THROUGH FEBRUARY

Our monthly report shows a deficit spending of nearly \$28,000 through February. (See report below). This is partially due to our making a final conference apportionment payment for 2024, in January of 2025. Additionally, we are budgeting to spend \$96,700 this year of "reserve funds (i.e. money in the bank from previous years). At the beginning of the past 2 years, I have anticipated/expected that we would spend between \$50,000 and \$75,000 each year from our reserves, but we have ended up using substantially less than that. Meaning that significantly more money has been given to the church each of the past couple years than has been pledged/anticipated. So...I'm not surprised that we are showing a YTD deficit. We are a very loving church community that reaches out to show God's love in our church, in the community and throughout the world. 

# Holy Hamor Sanday

On April 27th, Camp UMC will resurrect an old Easter custom that was started by the Greeks in the early centuries of Christianity - Holy Hilarity or Holy Humor Sunday on the Sunday after Easter.


For centuries in Eastern Orthodox, Catholic, and Protestant countries, the week following Easter Sunday was observed by the faithful as "days of joy and laughter" with parties, and picnics to celebrate Jesus' resurrection.

Pastors and churchgoers played practical jokes on each other, drenched each other with water, told jokes, sang and danced (and who knows, CUMC may even have an "open mic" moment on this day).

Early theologians like Augustine, Gregory of Nyssa, and John Chrysotom enjoyed this day and told their worshippers that it was the day God played a practical joke on the devil by raising Jesus from the dead. The early theologians called it, Risus paschalis - the Easter laugh."

Be at Camp UMC on April 27th for Holy Humor Sunday and come believing that Jesus is the "LIFE" of the party.

In 1988 the Fellowship of Merry Christians began encouraging churches and prayer groups to resurrect Bright Sunday celebrations and call it "Holy Humor Sunday," with the theme: "Jesus is the LIFE of the party."
