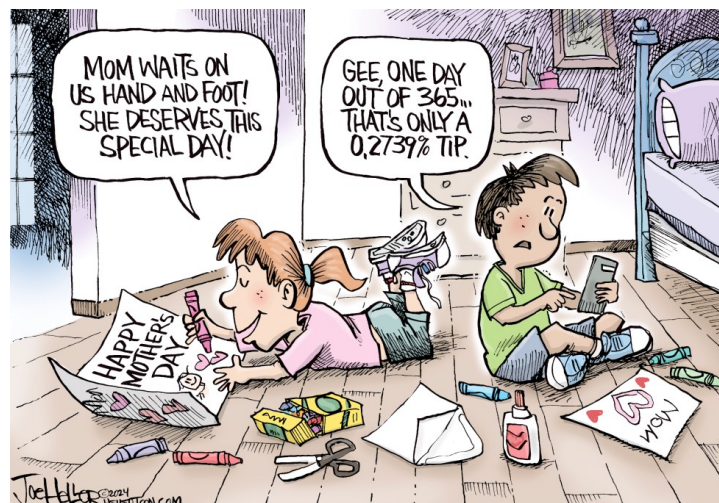
MOTHER'S DAY PRAYER

ANNUAL CONFERENCE June 11-14

At This years conference, 4 constitutional amendments recommended by the General Conference will be voted on at Annual Conference.

OVERVIEW OF THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMMENDMENTS

BALLOT #1 Worldwide Regionalization: Regionalization allows United Methodists throughout our connection to best serve their unique communities as they share the love of God, make disciples and transform the world.

BALLOT #2 Inclusiveness of the Church: Add to the constitution that neither "gender" nor "ability" are bars to church membership.

BALLOT #3 Racial Justice: Take an explicit stand against racism, racial inequity, colonialism, white privilege, and white supremacy.

BALLOT #4 Local Pastor Voting Eligibility: Clarify educational requirements for licensed local pastors to vote for General Conference clergy delegates.

Camp Volunteer In Mission (VIM) Report

March 29 – April 5, 2025

Costa Rica Mission Projects (CRMP) campus is located in San Isidro del General, Costa Rica. At the campus there are three large cabins. Each cabin has 24 bunk beds, two bathrooms and showers. There is a large dining hall at the campus for daily meals, and at night we gather there for our nightly devotions. The campus also houses a weekday child care center for children 3 thru 6 years old. Located in the main building, CRMP also provides counselling programs for the local community. The grounds and pathways within the campus flourish with tropical vegetation including banana trees and coffee plants.

On Sunday morning, we were invited to worship at Iglesia Metodista Gracia Church located in downtown San Isidro. Although the service was in Spanish, we felt the vibe and excitement. Our brothers and sisters welcomed us, and we all felt it was a special honor for us to attend their church. After lunch, we visited down town San Isidro and stopped by a local favorite ice cream shop called “POPS” for ice cream.

Located 48 miles south of San Isidro in the foothills of Talamanca Mountains is the small community of Santa Marta. The Iglesia Metodista Evangelica church started here in a small house, then moved to a large shed and is now a new Methodist Church still under construction. This is where we will spend the week. The main sanctuary is complete, the kitchen and three Sunday school classrooms still needed work.

Bright and early on Monday morning, we were introduced to three gentlemen who are paid staff members in charge of construction projects for CRMP. Hugo (Papa), his son Huguito, and Pedro. For the next several days, our team would develop and forge a unique bond with them. These guys showed us what work was needed, and then turned our team loose.

Typical Workdays – Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday: Sunrise comes early in San Isidro. Usually, one or two of us are up and have started the coffee around 5:00 AM. About the same time, the sun rises over the mountains and shines across the CRMP campus, God’s creatures began to awaken. The birds are loudly chirping and animals are moving thru beautiful trees and bushes. During this special time, God provides spiritual nourishment. Simply by listening, seeing, and in reflecting on God’s word, you hear his voice and witness to his awesome creations.

7:00 AM: Breakfast. Each day we were treated to a delightful breakfast by our hosts. Blessings shared by each of us, and small talk ensues, then we gather of our belongings.

8:00 AM: Depart for Santa Marta. The bus ride to Santa Marta takes a little over an hour. Within a few minutes, we’re in rural Costa Rica. Sugarcane and pineapple plantations dot the landscape. There are no tourists here. Just small towns and farmers. The majority of Costa Ricans are farmers. Most of the work on these plantations is done by manual labor. Hard work!

9:00 AM: Arrive at the new church and get ready to start working. Fabricating best describes the work we did. That is, our tasks included: grinding down weld spots on window bars that were cut and welded together, anchoring metal door frames that required a steel rebar hammered into cement, then spot welded to the metal frames and then grinded down, ready for paint. We cut metal screens for the windows and above doorways for the kitchen and the classrooms. This task meant working on ladders. Precise measurements, and using a heavy and somewhat awkward grinder to cut the metal screens. Touch up painting was needed and again required standing on tall ladders to reach each area. Everyone had a chance to work with different tools and tasks.

VIM) Report (Cont.)

By mid-morning on Tuesday, we had found our stride. Pedro, Jim and Phil were off cutting, welding and then grinding metal (fabricating). Steve, Makenzie and myself followed close behind them by cutting large metal screens and then fastening the screens into the metal frames with impact drills while on ladders. Yep, loud noise and sparks everywhere became a normal part of our work day. In between jobs, Makenzie went on her own and painted areas that needed painting. Again, up and down on tall ladders.

12 Noon Lunch-time: On Monday, we were treated to a special lunch cooked by the Santa Marta church member. Tuesday through Thursday CRMP provided a variety of food and fruits for us to make sandwiches for lunch. After the food was gone, it was time for siesta. This meant finding a cool and quiet spot. Some went in to the church and laid on the cool floor or laid down on a bench. Some laid in hammocks hung outside.

1:30ish PM: Resume Work. Sparks were flying, grinders were grinding and touch-up painting was in full swing. Laughter and good conversation could be heard everywhere.

3:30 PM: Work stopped. All the tools were put away. Ladders moved inside. Oh, by the way, two of us enjoyed a 3:00 PM coffee break made by Pedro each day! Guess who?

4:00ish PM: Depart Worksite. We rode on the bus riding through the valley lined with sugarcane and pineapple plantations headed back to the CRMP campus. In most cases, the ride back was a little quieter. A crew of tired missionaries from CAMP UMC were looking at the beautiful mountains and scenery. Reflecting on a day's work, and enjoying their time with each other.

5:00 PM: Back at CRMP and shower time! Oh yeah, since we were the only team at CRMP this week, there was no need to wait for an available shower!

6:00 PM: Dinner. Let it be known; no one would go hungry this week. Each night, we were treated to different local cuisines. Classic combinations of rice and beans, meat, fish, plantains, salad, ice cream and fruits. Yum.....

7:00 PM: Nightly Devotions. Pastor Jim led our nightly devotions. Jim created a "7-Day Mission Trip Devotions" booklet for each of us. Each devotion had different titles about the challenges of mission trips. The theme throughout the week was, "What Did You See, Smell, Hear, Feel or Do Today?". These devotions were special for all of us. Connecting with God, unity, teamwork, and time for personal experiences.

The above scenario would repeat itself throughout the week. On Wednesday night, we were invited back to the Iglesia Metodista Gracia Church located in downtown San Isidro. They call this service "Recharge" as in recharging your spiritual growth mid week. The service was very inspiring. The pastor took time to pray with each of us before we said our good byes. Yes, of course we had to stop at POPS! That ice cream shop was beckoning us! We spent this time with Daniel our bus driver, and Wil's wife (Wil Bailey is the Director of CRMP) and her friend chatting..... about the new church and our time at CRMP.

Thursday afternoon came real fast. Our last day. After the tools and ladders were put away, we had special time with our new friends. It is said, when you say goodbye, it's never a permanent thing. For those of us who believe in Jesus Christ, our "goodbye" is only a temporary thing. We shared smiles, hugs and handshakes.

Culture Day: We travelled to Manuel Antonio National Park. This park is located in a coastal rainforest nature reserve and sustains wildlife and multiple marine animals. The beautiful sea-shore within the park is very popular tourist destination. Mid-afternoon, we travelled up the hillside and had dinner at El Avion. The views from the restaurant over the hills and sea coast were incredible. Reflection and conversation about our week in Santa Marta filled the air.

International mission trips are special and unique. There are a lot of moving parts behind the scenes to pull it all together. Thanks to Kevin Smith, Hart Merriam and Jimmy Volosin who drove team to and from the airport in the church van very early hours in the morning, and very late hours in the evening.

Special thanks to Pastor Terry, Barbara and Howard Varnam. This trip would not have been possible without their support!

Final thoughts. Attending the Iglesia Metodista Gracia Church in San Isidro, it's fair to say **"we were churched"**. Their service is lively, passionate and high-level energy. Their message, all believers are called to be disciple-makers and show God's love to everyone. Our mission trip and contribution to the new church in Santa Marta is what love is all about. When the Lord's sovereign hand reaches down, and you take hold it, you trust God without any worries and fears, and amazing things happen.

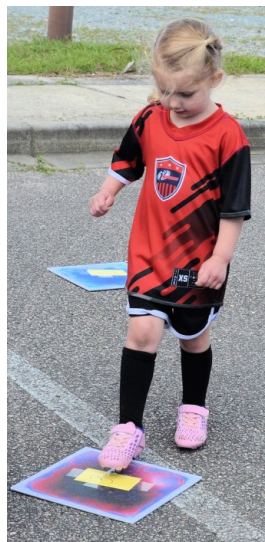

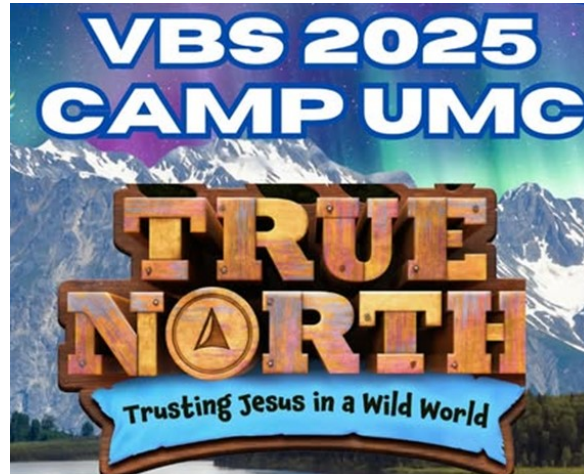

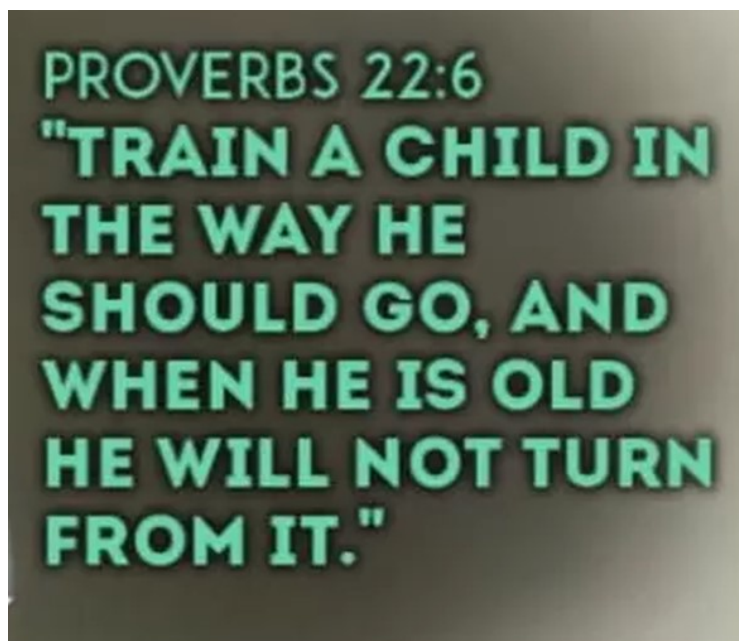

What is TEFAP?

TEFAP is a federal program administered by the USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) that helps low-income individuals and households access nutritious food. The USDA purchases a variety of foods from U.S. growers and producers, and makes them available to state distributing agencies, who then distribute them to local agencies like food banks, food pantries and soup kitchens.

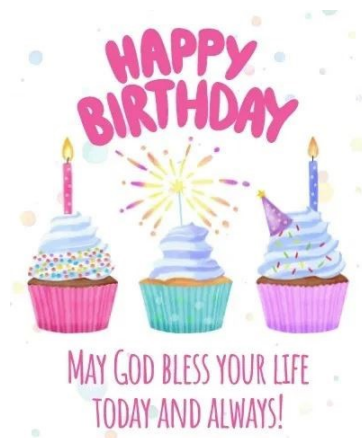
NEW PASTOR
